

My First Snakes and Ladders is an early introduction to board games, featuring chunky 3D playing pieces and colourful illustrations

Contents

• 1 six-piece playing board • 4 two-piece character playing pieces • 4 character discs • 1 dice

When young children are introduced to board games, they can learn about turn taking, winning and losing, identifying numbers and counting spaces. Board games also develop hand-eye coordination and dexterity in rolling the dice and moving the pieces around the board.



Each player chooses a character disc and a matching slot together character. Place the disc in front of you to remind you which character is yours, then assemble your character playing piece. Place it on the table, next to the playing board, ready to move onto the space with a 1 on it.













The youngest player starts by rolling the dice and moving the number of spaces shown.





If you land on the bottom of a ladder, move your character to the space at the top of the ladder.

Play passes to the next player.





The winner

The winner is the first player to reach the finish space (the house). You do not need to roll the extact number to win.





If you land on a snake's head

If you land on a **snake's head**, move your character to the space at the bottom of the snake's tail.

Play passes to the next player.
